Ferne Katleman, President, formally opened the 88th Annual Meeting Business Session.

THE FEDERAL BUDGET AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Mark Talisman, Executive Director of the Washington Action Office of the Council of Jewish Federations, offered an analysis of the serious harm which could be inflicted on the delivery of social services if significant reductions are made in the Federal Budget.

Although the problem is one which would effect all Americans, Mr. Talisman noted, "Many Jews and Jewish agencies will likewise suffer."

He urged increased efforts to maintain an adequate level of governmental spending for social services and a renewed effort to increase the commitment of the Jewish community to the plight of the economically and socially disadvantaged.

RESOLUTIONS

Dr. Lawrence Rubin, Chair of the CJCS Public Issues Committee, presented the report of that committee. The resolutions, as presented, were approved by the membership present, and dealt with: Federal Responsibility in Providing Human Services; Communal Responsibility for Meeting Human Needs; Israel; Soviet Jewry; and International Terrorism. Established in honor of Ralph I. Goldman, Executive Vice-President Emeritus of the AJJDC, whose career in Jewish communal service spans more than 40 years in the United States and Israel, the fellowship provides for a year of work-study in the New York headquarters of the AJJDC, or in the Paris or Jerusalem field offices. Only one fellowship is awarded each year.

Preference will be given to candidates in the early stages of their careers, with a demonstrated talent in the practice and/or study of Jewish communal service, who show a strong interest in international Jewish communal affairs. Candidates should preferably hold a Masters Degree or equivalent and demonstrate personal attributes of intelligence, integrity and leadership.

A paper evaluating the Fellow's experience should be completed by the close of the year.

Interested applicants should send a letter advocating candidacy to Ralph I. Goldman Fellowship, AJJDC, 711 Third Avenue, New York, NY 10017 on or before October 15, 1986. Information should include educational and work history, reasons for interest in this fellowship, plans for the future, and references. Selection will be announced January 1, 1987 for placement beginning September, 1987.

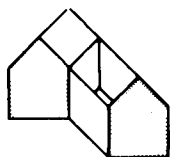
